1990-2013

- → Growing concern about the conservation of the European eel, *Anguilla anguilla*
- → Need for conservation and suitable management has been clearly identified by scientists, managers, and even by the public opinion.
- → The International Council for the Exploration of the Sea (ICES) since October 2002 pointed out the urgent need for a recovery plan for the European eel, that should include measures to reduce exploitation of all life stages and restore habitats.
- → Consultations at many levels






- →September 2007 Regulation 1100 is issued by EU
- → 2008 MS prepare and submit EMPs
- →2009 EMPs are evaluated and approved
- →2009-2011 EMPs implementation
- →2012 MS prepare and sumbit to EU a report based on monitoring and evaluation
- →2013 stock-wide assessment for eel




#### **History of Working Group**



# Joint EIFAAC/ICES Working Group on Eel, 2010 Recommendations

#### Main recommendations

- Since overall recruitment remains at an all time low since records began, the stock continues to decline and stock recovery will be a long-term process for biological reasons, all negative anthropogenic factors impacting on the stock and affecting the production/escapement of silver eels should be reduced to as low as possible, until long-term stock recovery is achieved.
- The 2001 meeting of WGEEL (ICES 2002) recommended the formation of an international commission that could act as a clearing house for handling and coordinating data collection & storage, stock assessment, management and research. Noting the urgent need to plan and coordinate the data collection and tool development for the 2012 post-evaluation; this recommendation is re-iterated.
- In particular, it is recommended to organise a (series of) workshops in relation to local eel stock monitoring, with a focus on standardisation and coordination, preparing for the 2012 post-evaluation, setting the scene for the 2013 international stock assessment.

## Study Group on International Ex-post evaluation on Eels (SGIPEE) London, United kingdom, 24-27 May 2011

"The European Eel Regulation recognises that cooperation between countries within and outside EU is desired, especially where management measures taken in one country might interact with measures taken in other countries. This has brought attention to the fact that the "missing" countries that are most relevant to the production assessment are the Mediterranean countries. The Mediterranean area has been neglected up to now regarding its role in the stock-wide assessment. A distinctive contribution regarding potential and actual escapement for Mediterranean areas might be envisaged, on the basis of specific growth patterns, silvering rates and sex-ratios "
